Curriculum

A three-week program of one-week modules each in the Law of the European Union, International Arbitration and Dispute Resolution, and Human Rights Law, totaling 4½ (semester) hours of ABA-approved credit. In Dublin, classes will meet at the Independent Colleges classroom building on Dawson Street, across St. Stephen's Green from our apartments, next to Trinity College, in the heart of the government buildings, shops and museums (www.independentcolleges.ie). In Belfast, classes will meet at the Queen's University (www.law.qub.ac.uk/).

Class Schedule

Classes meet from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Tuesdays through Fridays and on Mondays from 12:30 p.m. until 5 p.m. to maximize the free time of the students' weekends. During the first week, students will study Human Rights Law in Belfast. During the second and third week, students will study the Law of the European Union and International Arbitration and Dispute Resolution in Dublin.

Site Visits

In addition to the classroom program, an opening and closing dinner and a number of professional and cultural excursions are included at no additional cost. In Dublin these include visits to the parliament, courts and Law Society (law school for solicitors), as well as an evening at the Abbey national theatre and an optional hike around the Howth Peninsula. In and around Belfast, these include the government Assembly at Stormont, the Laganside Courts, and the Ecclesiastical Capital City Armagh as well as a day-long tour of the North Coast with visits to Dunluce Castle, the Giant's Causeway, and the Carrick-a-rede Rope Bridge.

Examination

Students will take a comprehensive written examination on the last day of class. Student evaluation and grading are entirely within the discretion of Duquesne University. Acceptance of any credit or grade given for the program is at the discretion of the student's home school. It is highly unlikely that participation in this program will accelerate graduation. Students who wish to accelerate graduation should contact their home school.

Accommodations

Housing is available in Belfast through Duquesne University at Stranmillis College, a college of Queen's University, Belfast for \$480 per week per person in private rooms with private bathrooms, including full, hot breakfast. www.stran.ac.uk/

Housing is available through Duquesne University in Premier Suites private apartments on Leeson Street, just off St. Stephen's Green, located in the heart of the city, for \$500 per week, per person in a shared apartment. These executive-quality apartments provide a front desk clerk, fully-equipped kitchen, TV and cable, computer in the lobby, bed linens, towels and laundry facilities. www.premiersuitesdublin.com

Spouses and children are welcome. Persons accompanying participants who want to obtain housing through Duquesne or attend the scheduled functions must complete a separate Application Form and pay the Application Fee and the Housing Charge, if applicable.

Ireland does require the same accommodations for individuals with disabilities that the United States does. Individuals requiring special accommodations should contact the program director so that we can make any necessary arrangements.

Costs and Payment Deadlines

Tuition, fees and housing costs are \$4,380 and are due by April 1, 2010. Travel costs to and from Ireland and all other costs and expenses not specifically mentioned are not included. We suggest you consult a travel agent and request the lowest available fare from any carrier. Fares vary widely.

Financial Aid

Students already qualifying for federal student loans for law school will qualify for student loans for this program. The amount of the loan for most students is more than sufficient for all set program costs plus spending money.

Travel

All students must have a valid passport.

Students are responsible for making their own travel arrangements to and from Ireland. Students not arranging housing through Duquesne will be responsible for making alternative arrangements.

Duquesne University will not be responsible for any personal injury, property damage or illness encountered by participating students during the program. All students are advised to purchase appropriate medical, accidental and travel insurance.

Application

Enrollment is open to American and foreign law students and to American and foreign graduate school students. All applicants must be in good academic standing. Enrollment is on a first-come, first-served basis. *Space is limited.*

Cancellation

Duquesne University reserves the right to cancel the program due to insufficient enrollment or other extraordinary emergency conditions. In the event of cancellation, deposits will be refunded.
