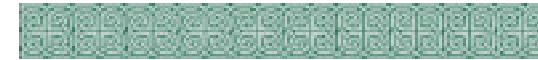

Curriculum

A three-week program of one-week modules each in the law of the European Union, international arbitration and dispute resolution, and human rights law, totaling 4½ (semester) hours of ABA-approved credit. In Dublin, classes will meet at the American College, located in Georgian buildings on Merrion Square, including the historic home of Oscar Wilde (<http://www.amcd.ie/>). In Belfast, classes will meet at the Queen's University (<http://www.law.qub.ac.uk/>).

Class Schedule

Classes meet from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Tuesdays through Fridays and on Mondays from 12:30 p.m. until 5 p.m. to maximize the free time of the students' weekends. During the first week, students will study Human Rights and Equality Law in Belfast. During the second and third week, students will study the Law of the European Union and International Arbitration and Dispute Resolution in Dublin.

Examination

Students will be evaluated based on one three-hour, cumulative examination covering the three subjects. The examination, held on Friday, June 29, begins at 9 a.m. and ends at noon.

Student evaluation and grading are entirely within the discretion of Duquesne University. Acceptance of any credit or grade given for the program is at the discretion of the student's home school. It is highly unlikely that participation in this program will accelerate graduation. Students who wish to accelerate graduation should contact their home school.

Faculty

Brian Hutchinson, Associate Dean University College Dublin, Faculty of Law

Dean Hutchinson holds a Diploma in Arbitration Law from the Dublin Institute of Technology; Degree of Barrister-at-Law from The Honorable Society of King's Inns; Master of Laws and Bachelor of Civil Law from University College Cork. Dean Hutchinson specializes in International Commercial Arbitration and Alternative Dispute Resolution.

Gavin Barrett, College Lecturer In Law University College Dublin, Faculty of Law

Professor Barrett earned his LL.B. and Ph.D. from Trinity College, Dublin. He specializes in the Law of the European Union and the Commercial and Social Law of the European Communities.

Bernadette Rainey, Lecturer In Law University of Cardiff

Subsequent to completing her Ph.D. at Queen's University, Belfast, Dr. Rainey was a research fellow at the University of Wales, Aberystwyth to work on an AHRB funded project examining the impact of the Human Rights Act on the National Assembly of Wales. She taught and conducted research at Swansea University. She is a member of the Socio-Legal Studies Association. Dr. Rainey was a member of the Queen's law faculty until 2006 and has recently joined the University of Cardiff.

Kirk W. Junker, Professor of Law Duquesne University School of Law

Professor Junker received his J.D. from Duquesne University, his Ph.D. from the University of Pittsburgh and completed his postdoctoral work at the University of Bonn, Germany. Professor Junker specializes in the Law of the European Union and in International Environmental Law, which he also teaches regularly at the University of Cologne, Germany.

Ciarán Mac Murchaidh, Lecturer in Irish Language St. Patrick's College, Dublin City University

Dr. Mac Murchaidh's research interests are in the teaching of Irish grammar and 18th century religious literature. He was awarded a Ph.D. by National University of Ireland, Maynooth. He has edited numerous publications, including a collection of essays on the current state of the Irish language. Cois Life published his Irish grammar *Cruinnscriobh na Gaeilge* in 2002, a second and enlarged edition of which appeared in 2004. His most recent publication is a bilingual anthology of spiritual poetry from the early Irish to the Modern Irish periods, *Lón Anama: Poems for Prayer from the Irish Tradition* (Cois Life, Dublin 2005).

Accommodations

Housing is available in Belfast through Duquesne University at Stranmillis College, A College of Queen's University, Belfast for \$350 per week per person in private en suite rooms, including full, hot breakfast. <http://www.stran.ac.uk/>

Housing is available through Duquesne University at Trinity College Dublin, located in the heart of the city, for \$520 per week, per person in en suite double rooms or apartments. The College provides all linen and operates a regular housekeeping service. In all rooms complimentary tea and coffee making facilities are provided. <http://www.tcd.ie/accommodation/>

Spouses and children are welcome. Persons accompanying participants who want to obtain housing through Duquesne or attend the scheduled functions must complete a separate Application Form and pay the Application Fee and the Housing Charge, if applicable.

Ireland does require the same accommodations for individuals with disabilities that the United States does. Individuals requiring special accommodations should contact the program director so that we can make any necessary arrangements.

Costs and Payment Deadlines

Tuition and fees are \$2,050 and are due by April 14, 2007. Included are course materials, a welcoming dinner, dinner at the King's Inns and visits to legal institutions and cultural attractions in Ireland and Northern Ireland.

Housing costs are \$1,390 and are due by April 14, 2007.

Travel costs to and from Ireland and all other costs and expenses not specifically mentioned are not included. We suggest you consult a travel agent and request the lowest available fare from any carrier. Fares vary widely.
